








# LIFE WORK Healing Relationships

# A Positive Attitude Can Build A Congregation

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Did you know that having a positive attitude not only affects you but also those you are with? Sadly the reverse also is true. As we begin the new session at Orchardhill I want to challenge us all to be more positive about what each of us can bring in service of God's Kingdom.

Think about it: if we all have a positive attitude you feel good about yourself and the future of your church. Our self-esteem and self-confidence will become infectious. I am not suggesting that we are false in our positive attitude, but I am saying that there is a lot to be positive about. Look at Summer Mission week with the young people or the testimony of those who went to Tuni in India on the mission trip or just look at our new Thinking Allowed series. These are only the tip of iceberg.

If you are positive and focused on the good things at Orchardhill, your attitude will attract other people. People are drawn to a happy congregation made up of positive people. These happy, positive people tend to have more friends and their congregations tend to be healthier. Think of those words of the chorus that says: "They will know that you are Christians by your love."

Think about it. Would you rather spend time or hang around a church comprising people who are always negative? Or would you prefer to hang around a church that is happy and positive?

I know which one I prefer. Give

thanks for the child that laughs or cries when we are gathered in prayer. Give thanks for our Church Officer, Isabella: don't take her for granted. Give thanks for those who are leading us in praise, even if it is not always to your taste. thanks for the Choir, SoundWaves and CrossWords. Give thanks for Stepping Stones, Bridges, Fusion and YF. Give thanks for the Orchard Café. Give thanks for all the uniformed organisations. Give thanks for the Guild. This is not meant to be a comprehensive list: so I suggest you continue. Sometimes we can take things and, more importantly, each other for granted. Maybe a word of encouragement is needed.

On the other hand, when you spend time with people who are negative or always complaining, it will leave you feeling depressed, sad, and emotionally drained.

For instance, I had a friend who was always negative and complaining. There was always something wrong or someone was mean to her child or treated her child poorly. It was always the "poor me" syndrome. No matter what, it seemed to her that everyone was being unfair or mistreating her or her family. After listening to the same things over and over again, not only was I tired of listening to it, I felt emotionally drained. Every time I spent time with her, I felt sad, depressed, tired, and emotionally drained.

Believe it or not, a church is no different.

I know what I want for Orchardhill. Let's move forward with an infectious outlook to the future and appreciate each other more.

#### **Christian Aid**



The local group of Giffnock churches raised £6284 for Christian Aid in the past year, which will contribute to alleviate problems all over the world. To illustrate a few – combating malaria in Zambia; justice in India; HIV orphans in Africa; helping the poorest and most vulnerable with water and sanitation in Irag; and 19 million people in need of food aid in West Africa.

Most of the funds that we raised were door-to-door collection (over by

£5500). So this is a vital part of our effort to provide help to those in dire need.

Orchardhill collectors raised over £2000, and our thanks to them all. Some of the churches in the Giffnock group are finding it more difficult to do door-to-door collecting because of the age group of the congregation. So we are blessed that we have people willing and able to give their time and efforts to Christian Aid.





All sections of the 86<sup>th</sup> Glasgow Company of the Boys' Brigade have begun the new session. A lot of thought has gone into preparing a challenging and varied programme based on the fairly new award scheme. This year we hope to increase our numbers, and we invite any boy who might be interested to come along and join in the fun.

Children with nothing giving everything; children of nothing becoming everything. These children work hard and play hard, they love each other like one big family, and they let the light of Jesus shine through in their smiles.

During our time there we worked computer-skills through а basic course and watched as the children embraced the new technology and strived for success. We were also fortunate enough to take three classes for two days each. also allowed us time to paint three murals in the classrooms, focusing on the areas we were studying.

Speaker: Professor Charles W. Munn

Lecture: "A Right Relationship with Money -

are you in it?"

Tax havens, living standards, the widening gap between rich and poor, interest rates and credit unions all call us to a right relationship with money and ensuring that this good economic practice is embedded in social relationships. There is a danger of following the markets and the need to control the "invisible hand" of the markets lest the vulnerable and poor will always be at the end of the line.



Professor Charles W Munn was chairman of the Church of Scotland Special Commission on the Purposes of Economic Activity 2010-2012. The report outlines four priorities for government, society and the church that should be at the heart of economic considerations:

- Reducing inequality
- Ensuring sustainability
- Promoting mutuality
- Ending global poverty

Charles Munn also writes business history and recently completed a history of the Airdrie Savings Bank. He is currently writing a history of the Alliance Trust PLC. He is a lay member of the board of the Chartered Insurance Institute and of the European Financial Planning Association. He serves as a public interest member of the Investigations Committee of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Scotland.

From 1988 to 2007 he was chief executive of the Chartered Institute of Bankers in Scotland and served for a time as president of the European Bank Training Network. Before that he was a university lecturer for 13 years and a bank clerk in Glasgow for three years.

He has served as a member of the board of the Scottish Qualifications Authority and of the Quality Assurance Agency for Higher Education. He was also chairman of the board of the Call Centre Association. He is an honorary professor at the Universities of Glasgow, Stirling and Dundee where he gives occasional lectures on business ethics.

He is an elder in Dalgety Parish Church in Fife and was a member of the Kirk's Special Commission on Ethics in Investment and Banking 1986-88.

A glass of wine or soft drink will be served before the lecture from 7.30pm.



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Aim to inspire young people and old alike to reconsider or consider for the first time the relevance of a lifestyle that includes a faith in Jesus

Does that inspire you? Chips' aim over 28 years and longer, if you add what existed in Orchardhill before the first summer mission in 1984, is to consider the relevance of a lifestyle with faith in Jesus. This year our theme was linked to the Olympics, and while athletes were achieving new world records the organisers and government were hoping for a legacy of a fitter generation actively taking up sport and, depending upon whom you listen to, it seems to work.

Chips aimed to inspire with a variety of speakers – Dr Gary McFarlane OBE and Jean Couper (both former Orchardhill members), Alan Cameron (Emma Cameron Foundation, Stepping Stones' charity), and Rev Catherine Beattie, the Giffnock South minister. The speakers were taking us through what it means to consider whether to compete, race, win, persevere and be sporting as a Christian.

As for meeting our aims, I think we did, but it will depend on how you measure success. The numbers at Chips were slightly down this year. (Some may have chosen to go to London instead!) The average attendance remained 30/40 plus.

As for measuring whether relevance existed, that is trickier. Some things have remained the same over the years, and the consistency of support demonstrates that people both young and old get a boost from coming to Chips. Sadly the stage remains poorly decorated despite our boldest efforts and this year we even had lights supplied from our former assistant minister, Rev Gray Fletcher, who incidentally has taken holidays each year to participate at Huntly and Chips, morning and evening. Jennifer Evans painted and designed our banners with Olympic Rings, which demonstrates only one aspect of talent that exists in our young people.

It is worth taking breath at just what happened this week – at the enthusiasm of young people, at the speakers who often at some personal cost took time to explore the relevance of faith and were willing to share their own views.

Is there a relevance of a lifestyle that includes a faith in Jesus? Chips may not have the answers but it's a question that inspires hope. Chips means Christ Has Incredible Powers. It is testament to that statement that Chips exists today.
