Simply say "Thank You"

October means Harvest, and that means Thanksgiving time. During this month I will have taken our Harvest service with our harvest gifts split between Glasgow City Mission and the Lodging House Mission. This followed a week later with a visit to the P7s of Giffnock Primary School to talk about inclusion and the Harvest. The children will be taking the leading part in the school's Harvest service at Orchardhill on 11 October. This time the Harvest gifts will go to Glasgow City Mission.

Here is a beautiful description of this rich time of the year: "You crown the year with your bounty, and your carts overflow with abundance. The grasslands of the desert overflow; the hills are clothed with gladness. The meadows are filled with flocks and the valleys are mantled with corn; they shout for joy and sing." (Ps 65:11-13) What a beautiful picture of harvest, of blessing as the year begins to draw to a close!

The Psalms have a lot to say about Harvest and Thanksgiving. "May the peoples praise you, O God; may all the peoples praise you. Then the land will yield its harvest, and God, our God, will bless us." (Ps 67:5-6)

You may not be in farming, but you will have 'sown' things this

year: you may be growing certain relationships or work projects. Now is the time to review them: if they are doing well, thank God for them. If they are doing badly, pray for them, and do something positive about it. last Congregational Our meeting was one in which we took stock of our property as well as our finances. We believe that we are making real progress in building relationships with our community and those who use our buildings, but for us to fully accomplish our vision for Orchardhill we need to ensure that our buildings are well maintained and we have the finances to resource our work. That means it is up to each member to review their giving. We are looking at a deficit for this year of £32,000, which translates to roughly an extra £3.00 per member per week. Some who can should give more to compensate for those who cannot afford anymore.

As we have said at the annual stated meeting, the Responsibility is Ours.

"Praise our God, O peoples," cries the Psalmist with joy. "He has preserved our lives and kept our feet from slipping ... you brought us to a place of abundance." (Ps 66:8,9,12) If there is any 'abundance' in your life, have you thanked God for it?



LIFE WORK Tabeetha Centenary







We look forward to welcoming everyone interested in these talks.



Speaker: Professor Charles W. Munn

Lecture: "A Right Relationship with Money - are you in it?"

Tax havens, living standards, the widening gap between rich and poor, interest rates and credit unions all call us to a right relationship with money and ensuring that this good economic practice is embedded in social relationships. There is a danger of following the markets and the need to control the "invisible hand" of the markets lest the vulnerable and poor will always be at the end of the line.

Professor Charles W Munn was chairman of the Church of Scotland Special Commission on the Purposes of Economic Activity 2010-2012. The report outlines four priorities for government, society and the church that should be at the heart of economic considerations:

- Reducing inequality
- Ensuring sustainability
- Promoting mutuality
- · Ending global poverty

Charles Munn also writes business history and recently completed a history of the Airdrie Savings Bank. He is currently writing a history of the Alliance Trust PLC. He is a lay member of the board of the Chartered Insurance Institute and of the European Financial Planning Association. He serves as a public interest member of the Investigations Committee of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Scotland.

He is an elder in Dalgety Parish Church in Fife and was a member of the Kirk's Special Commission on Ethics in Investment and Banking 1986-88.

News from Pakistan

Susan Clark, our Mission Partner, had been in Pakistan for her first sojourn from 25 May to 16 August before she had to come home to deal with visa arrangements. She has returned to Pakistan. Here is a summary of her May-August visit.

Bishop Samuel Azariah, Dioceses of Raiwind, and Alice Garrick, Director of Women's Development Service, made me very welcome when I arrived in Pakistan in May. Alice and I will work together.

I live in a flat in the dioceses compound. The flat is above the nursery department of St Peter's School. It is a mixed-gender English medium school, which takes children from nursery to secondary. This is a fee-paying school, as is the girls-only school, also in the compound. There is a third school, Dar-Al-Salam, for children and young people with additional support needs. A wall surrounds the compound, with security at every gate. Security is a big issue for all Christians.

The Cathedral of Praying Hands is the church I attend. There are two services each Sunday: one in English, the other in Urdu. The services are Anglian. The Urdu service is busy with many young people. The English service is not well attended, but most are young people.



I attended language school in Murree during June and July.

The Women's Development Service has set ambitious aims and objectives for the coming three years. All the work is entirely dependant on getting funding all of which is external to the Church of Pakistan.

The projects are:

- Child Protection aims to provide basic education free to encourage parents to allow children to attend school as opposed to work or begging.
- Providing HIV/Aids information and health screening to vulnerable women
- Baath Health Centre aims to improve situation for people with a physical disability. Many beggars have physical disabilities either from birth or because of accidents.
- Earning Hands provides practical skill advice for women and enables them to support their families – this is the project I will have most involvement with.

Some of the challenges:

- Security
- Load-shedding electricity goes off frequently
- Shopping as a woman on my own, I have to be taken to shops
- Cooking very difficult in the heat I have lost a lot of weight
- Keeping fit as I cannot take exercise outside.

Prayer requests:

- For Christians to be able to practice their faith without persecution or hindrance
- For women to be able to live without abuse or exploitation
- For children to have access to education and be free of abuse.
- For Pakistan and its government and judiciary that they will govern in fairness and justice.
- For my work with women and their children
- For my continued language study.

Thank you, for continuing prayer and support. I greatly appreciate all the contact and interest.
