A Lesson from Jonah

Dear friends

The story of Jonah and the whale is famous. But many people – even good church-going Christians – dismiss it as just a tall story to entertain the children. But it taught me one of the most important lessons of my working life.

I had been a minister for more than 10 years. I found that I was spending too much time trying to raise money, mostly for the upkeep of the building complex. I couldn't give up on the building, but I sensed that I and the congregation were all dancing faster and faster to its tune. I knew that that wasn't what the church was really for, but I couldn't stop. I worried: I knew I had gone wrong.

I remember where I was when the solution came to me. And it was the story of Jonah. Jonah was furious with God for giving the city of Nineveh the chance to repent. Jonah wanted them punished for their sins.

He was livid when they listened to his

preaching and repented and were forgiven. But Jonah broke his heart over the death of a little plant, a gourd, which had been sheltering him from the sun. And God said to him: "You cry over a little plant that grew up in a night and died in a night? Should I not have a heart for that great city with its lost souls and all their cattle?"

So I knew that I needed to concentrate on the people and not worry about the building. From then on that was what I tried to do.

But you'll have to read the story, the Book of Jonah! It won't take you long. It's only 48 verses. Its truth boils down to this: We learn more important lessons from our times of difficulty than we do from our times of success. It was true for Jonah and true for me. I think it is a truth of human life.

Stepping Stones and Water Aid

On Sunday 2 February all the Stepping Stones children gathered together to learn a bit more about the charity that we are donating half of our collection to this year – Water Aid.

We watched a short film about the charity, which told us of the work they do and how our money will be spent to help children without clean, safe water or sanitation.

We had a true and false quiz about Water Aid and were very impressed that most of the children picked the right answers, proving they had listened carefully to the film commentary. After that we played a team game where each team member had to carry his or her bucket filled with water (shredded tissue paper) safely and quickly without spilling any! Abby was particularly good at this – slow and steady.

Fiona and Heather, from Bridges, had very

kindly volunteered to read a short drama for us comparing the lives of two girls – one from Scotland, and one from Ethiopia. Once again our Stepping Stoners listened intently.

We finished our morning by having a "water tasting". The children tried tap, sparkling, flavoured and bottled water then guessed, many correctly, which one was which.

We had intended that each child would decorate a bottle of water to take home, but as usual we ran out of time. So the bottles went home undecorated, along with a quiz or a word-search puzzle about hand washing hygiene, a topic which Water Aid work hard to promote in the countries where they work.

Hopefully, we all gained a little more knowledge about Water Aid and had lots of fun.

Mary's Meals in Haiti

I am delighted to report that in January I sent the amazing total of £1954 to Mary's Meals for their work in Haiti. To everyone who made this possible, many thanks from Magnus MacFarlane-Barrow, chief executive of Mary's Meals. In his letter he tells me that they are now feeding over 21,000 children in Haiti with a good meal in their place of education. These children now have a chance of an education, making a way out of their poverty.

The Orchardhill Guild will be continuing to support Mary's Meals in Haiti this year. As usual, we will be offering Sunshine Bags to the congregation in April for you to fill over the summer months. We saw a lot of sunshine last year, which perhaps helped the total. Maybe the same sunshine this year?

Thousands of Athletes family members have been hosted over the years by the **Athlete Family Homestay Programme** and for Glasgow 2014, the Scottish Government have invited us to coordinate a **Volunteer Homestay Programme** for the official volunteers (Clyde-siders). Homes are needed in Glasgow and its surrounding area but also around the other venues. This is a unique opportunity to offer hospitality and friendship and we anticipate many will want to open up their homes.

Many churches in the immediate vicinity of venues are planning

to host and support Games staff, volunteers and visitors. These churches have a tremendous opportunity to show hospitality and service in Christ's name. Could **Orchardhill** be one of these **hospitality centers**? We have good transport links by bus and train to the city venues, we're close to the Mountain Bike venue at Cathkin Braes, and the Neilston line (Williamwood, Whitecraigs) goes to Hampden Park (Mount Florida). So Giffnock / Clarkston / Whitecraigs is an ideal place for people to stay.

The **Queen's Baton Tour** is also a wonderful opportunity for churches to offer hospitality. How could we help to host the crowds who gather to celebrate? A local task force is being set up in each town where the relay stops to help run community events that support the official celebrations.

How about organising a Community Festival?

Community Festivals are one of the best ways for churches to **engage with their wider community** and can also leave a legacy of **more local churches working together** to serve their community.

The festivals may include

Big screen showing the ceremonies or key events,

Fun for children including face painting, clowns and competitions

Sport based games

Free barbecue and tea and coffee

On Christmas day around 100 service users enjoyed a full three-course Christmas dinner with all the trimmings at the Lodging House Mission in East Campbell Street, served by 15 volunteers. Each of the service users received a gift-box before they left. Before the meal about 25 people attended the annual Christmas Day Carol Service at which Rev Graham Blount, the LHM's

vice-chairman, spoke a word of challenge and encouragement. Gratitude is extended to the many generous congregations and individuals for their monetary and shoebox donations which contributed greatly to these festive efforts.

2014 has got off to a good start. The number of service users is gradually creeping up, which in one way is encouraging as people feel the LHM offers appropriate support, but it is also sad that more people need its help. However, it will continue to work and offer assistance to anyone who needs help and support.

The LHM's church services are still going well. Attendances at all the services remain constant. The number of individuals seeking chaplaincy support has gone up slightly, especially requests for prayer. Wendy, its ICC student, is a great source of encouragement and often brings a new and fresh approach to the way they look at scripture.

Classes have started up again and are doing well. There has been an increase in the number of speakers of other languages attending its ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) classes two days a week. The beginners' class is particularly busy with an average of 12 students attending each class. In addition, the learning centre open sessions have been very popular, allowing all service users to gain free internet access and the opportunity to improve their IT skills. The LHM Choir has started rehearsals in preparation for the return of Scottish Opera in February.

As you can see, it is a busy time ahead. Please continue to hold the work of the Lodging House Mission in your prayers.
