God's Promise Fulfilled

Dear members and friends of Orchardhill,

Much has happened since I stepped down from the post of Locum at Orchardhill in June, and I know that yours has not been an easy journey. Yet at the heart of our faith we believe that God fulfils his promises in unpromising situations.

Who, for example, would ever have thought of employing a poor, working-class female millworker from Dundee as a missionary leader? Yet that is exactly what happened. A hundred years ago on 15 January 1915 Mary Slessor died, one of the most astonishing Scottish women of her generation. Today her portrait adorns the Clydesdale Bank's £10 note. She was raised in a Dundee single-end, one of seven children in the family. TB took a terrible toll: only Mary lived beyond the age of 30. In the local United Presbyterian Church she taught in Sunday School and helped to run a youth club for tough young boys. She took a great interest in the work of her church's overseas missionaries.

Hearing of the death of David Livingstone, she decided she must go to Africa as a missionary. In Calabar, Nigeria, uncomfortable with the formality of the Scottish missionary programme and of the clothing she was expected to wear, she learned the local language and went out into the villages wearing local clothing. She confronted some of the practices of the local peoples: the culture required all twins to be killed at birth; widows were permanently confined to the hut; at the death of a chief, his wives and many slaves had to be killed to accompany him to the next world.

She herself saved many twins from death, explaining her actions in terms of her Christian faith. Her most persuasive argument was her extraordinary courage in the face of threats of violence. Time and again she stood unyielding, red-haired, her blue eyes unblinking, when arguing with a chief determined to put to death a slave or a wife or a warrior.

In 2001 my wife, Mary, and I visited Calabar and met with the Governor of Cross River State. Praising Mary Slessor, he said: "Some of the best things in our Nigerian culture have come from Dundee."

Yes. God's promise fulfilled in an unpromising situation. We shall find it always so.

I look forward to renewing friendships in the coming weeks!

Orchardhill is currently renewing its three-year Anti-Virus Licence. This is provided by Eset and is a comprehensive protection tool against attacks from the internet. It also incorporates a firewall and anti-spam email software.

Of the 30 licences available, some have been spoken for, but there are still some left. The cost is £25 per computer for not just one year but for three years, covering until February 2018.

Vacancy Procedures

Following Rev Chris Vermeulen's demission at the end of January, Orchardhill will be in a state of vacancy until a new minister is called and inducted. To provide clarity for the congregation, the *Orchardhill Record* offers a summary of the procedures to be followed in seeking a new minister.

When a charge becomes vacant the Presbytery Vacancy Procedure Committee meets with the Kirk Session to consult the elders on particular local circumstances and to discuss the implementation of the Presbytery Plan in relation to the charge. In Orchardhill's case that plan provides permission to call a minister on full tenure.

Presbytery will want to ensure certain matters: for example that ministry allocations have been met, that the manse is in good repair, and that specific requirements of the Presbytery Plan are being addressed. Once permission is granted by Presbytery (and sometimes there are reasons to "hasten slowly") the Kirk Session will prepare a Parish Profile, which would provide prospective applicants with background information about the congregation and the parish as well as how the congregation views the future mission and ministry in the parish.

An electoral roll is prepared (all members plus adherents), a Nominating Committee is elected by ballot at a meeting of the congregation, and that committee is given the task of advertising the charge and, in due course, interviewing candidates. These could be ministers who themselves apply or who are recommended or, indeed, who are approached by the Nominating Committee. That committee will bring a sole nominee to the congregation to preach at a morning service, and the congregation will then vote on whether to call that minister.

The Vacancy Procedure Committee will offer advice and assistance to the congregation at every stage of the vacancy, and the Interim Moderator plays an important role in the whole process. For everyone involved it is, of course, a matter for prayer.

The Guild

The Guild will meet on Monday 9 February at 2.00pm in the Fellowship Room to hear a talk by Mr David Wright on the history of Women at War.

Presbyteries for Kirk Proposal on Ministers in Civil Partnerships

A majority of Church of Scotland's presbyteries have voted in favour of supporting the General Assembly's proposed Act regarding Ministers and Deacons in Civil Partnerships. The margin was 32 for, 13 against: in percentage terms that was 71 to 29.

However, when measured by the votes of individual presbyters over all the presbyteries, the ballot was much closer – 55% to 45%.

Glasgow Presbytery's ballot, held at a special meeting in November, resulted in 127 for, 93 against (58-42%). Edinburgh was even more in favour (115-59), and all the other city and metropolitan presbyteries such as Dundee, Aberdeen, Hamilton and Stirling were in the Yes camp.

Outwith those presbyteries, however, no geographical agreement was obvious. For instance, in the south-west, Annandale and Eskdale were heavily for the proposed Act (23-7), Dumfries and Kirkcudbright were narrowly in favour (29-23), but Wigtown and Stranraer were 19-10 against.

Neighbours in the north-east produced similarly opposite results – Kindcardine and Deeside 28-13 for, Buchan 40-19 against. So it was also in the Borders – Duns 24-11 for, Jedburgh 22-10 against.

As its principal statement, the proposed Act affirms the historic and current doctrine and practice of the Church in relation to human sexuality and their application to ministers and deacons. However, a Kirk Session could be allowed to depart from that affirmation to permit the ordination, induction or appointment of a minister or deacon who is in a civil partnership. Before doing so, though, that Kirk Session would have to satisfy several caveats defined in the proposed Act.

Last year's General Assembly agreed to support the proposed Act, though only with the consent of the majority of presbyteries, a requirement defined in the longestablished Barrier Act: that was the reason for the round of presbytery ballots late last year. The proposed Act on civil partnerships will return to the General Assembly in May for the final vote.
