Rembrandt's Message

Dear members and friends of Orchardhill,

In January my wife, Mary, and I were visiting our son and daughter in London. One evening we went to an exhibition in the National Gallery in Trafalgar Square: "Rembrandt: The Late Works".

Having known joy, love, and success in his early years, Rembrandt van Rijn was beset by sorrow, disgrace and financial hardship by the time his life drew to a close. His beloved wife died soon after the birth of their fourth child, a son, their earlier children all having died in infancy. Later he lived with his much younger housemaid, who was excommunicated by the Church for living with him unmarried. He outlived his son and died in poverty and was buried in a churchyard grave for the poor. Twenty years after his death, as was the custom with the remains of the poor, what remained of his body was removed and destroyed.

The 90 works in this exhibition were created during the turmoil of Rembrandt's last years. Biblical scenes carry the emotional intensity of his Christian faith, and an astonishing picture of a post-mortem, "The Anatomy Lesson", shows him as unafraid to face mortality. I was taken by surprise when I saw that in larger paintings he did not always seem to have the perspective quite right. But to look at the faces he had painted, whether in group scenes or individual portraits, was to see into the character and the soul of each person. Of no face was this more true than of his own.

Four self-portraits from his last years display his readiness to face the truth about himself and his life. We see the man he thought himself to be. No vanity is displayed in the worn, weathered face. No pride is depicted in the plain rough clothing. No easy hope is communicated in the resigned and questioning expression.

In these self-portraits Rembrandt demonstrates that even gifts as great as his do not shield a person from the heavy burdens of life. I found this strangely comforting in my own lot which is so easy.

Sunshine Bags - Mary's Meals

Sunshine Bags will be available from Guild members at the church door every Sunday in April.

You probably know the concept behind Mary's Meals: feed a child one good meal a day in a place of learning, which gives the child the opportunity to benefit from education and climb out of poverty. Throughout the world Mary's Meals are feeding the amazing total of 989,791 children every day and the average global cost is £12.20 per child per year, less than we spend on a good restaurant meal for one person.

When the Ebola crisis hit Liberia, a country where Mary's Meals have been established since the 1990s during the terrifying civil war, all the schools were closed and military blockades were set up to restrict the movement of people and thus limit the spread of the virus. This, however, has resulted in soaring food prices and increased hunger. Determined to continue to help, Mary's Meals launched an emergency response, distributing food supplies to families in their own homes. At one point they were providing daily meals this way to 70,000 children.

We have decided this year to extend our appeal to Mary's Meals throughout the world rather than concentrate solely on the need in Haiti.

May I remind you of the idea behind the Sunshine Bags? Whenever the sun shines, when something good happens to you or one of your family or whenever you feel the presence and love of God particularly close, put some money in the bag. As usual the bags will be gathered in during October: so quite a few months to fill your bag.

Eastwoodhill Coffee Morning

Eastwoodhill Residential Home's annual coffee morning will be held on Saturday 18 April in the Giffnock South Church halls (10.00am-noon). Tickets (£2) and the very popular quizzes (£1) are available from Evelyn McMurtrie (the Kirk Session representative on the Friends of Eastwoodhill Group) and Jeanette Birnie (the Guild representative).

The Friends Group are looking for a new chairman. A volunteer would be welcomed. It is not an onerous role with a meeting once a month. Meetings rarely last too long!

Since last year Eastwoodhill has had some important changes. Mrs Jennifer Gibson, the Unit Manager, left to have a baby (a wee girl called Kirsty), and she was replaced by Mrs Pat Lawrence as Acting Unit Manager. A few weeks later Mrs Sharon Scully, the Depute Unit Manager, was seconded to Whinnieknowe Care Home in Nairn as Acting Unit Manager. While Jennifer was on maternity leave she accepted a training position within CrossReach. Pat has now been appointed Unit Manager, and Sharon has returned to Eastwoodhill. So the Home can enjoy more stability within the senior staff.

Eastwoodhill is nearly always full and continues to have people seeking a room. The latest inspection report in September last year was very positive about the care given to residents.

Eastwoodhill has been asked to take part in a pilot scheme, with East Renfrewshire Council offering two beds on a 10-week basis to people no longer requiring hospital care but not quite ready to go home. The first two people who were part of this scheme were very happy in Eastwoodhill but have now gone home. The pilot has been extended, and two more people are now living in the Home before they return to their own homes.

The Friends of Eastwoodhill continue their activities, including a games afternoon every few weeks. Every friend visits one or two residents on a regular basis. One friend, with the help of another, holds a Guild meeting every two weeks (with home baking). They have about eight people in the Guild just now, a very popular item on the calendar.

The annual coffee morning is run by the Friends to raise funds for Eastwoodhill. That money, augmented by donations from Guilds, churches and relatives of residents, pays for Christmas gifts for residents and staff and helps with the cost of outings. Last year's fund-raising focussed on a new health treatment room: this is now complete and in use. This year's efforts will be concentrating on personalising the bedrooms, allowing residents to choose their bed linen and curtains, all to make their rooms special to them.

The coffee morning will have all the usual stalls, baking, books, bric-a-brac (including toys) and toiletries. If you would like to make a donation of any kind, please contact either Evelyn (571 2512) or Jeanette (638 0457).
