An Election Remembered

Dear members and friends of Orchardhill,

This coming election stirs memories. On 27 April 1994 my wife Mary was in South Africa for that country's very first all-race elections. For three months in the run-up to Election Day she had been part of the team of Ecumenical Peace Monitors, attending rallies and political confrontations in KwaZulu Natal as the election approached. People like Mary, from churches across Europe and round the world, did whatever they could to ensure a peaceful outcome to the process. No one knew what might happen. Dreadful things were done in the years leading to the end of apartheid, and there were widespread fears that whites would violently refuse to relinquish power and that blacks would repay centuries of injustice with bloodshed.

The peace monitors were distinguished by their UN-blue tabards and hats. Small groups of them stood as observers in places of tension, to witness whether the security forces were acting impartially. Their greatest weapon was their visibility in these exposed situations, and they were armed only with their courage. Often they were caught in cross-fire between armed demonstrators of different political parties, at other times confronted by gun-fire between demonstrators and the security forces.

As Election Day approached many dreaded "a blood-bath".

Mary remembers the briefing she and other monitors received two days before their assignment to their polling station. The security commander told them: "I can give you five armed police. But when my five men are dead there is nothing more I can do for you."

The day came. The tensions remained. But peace reigned. The monitors were able to report that the election had been "relatively free and relatively fair."

Was it in answer to prayer? Many in the churches believed it to be so. And the powerful influence of one man, Nelson Mandela, cannot be over-estimated.

So what of our Election on 7 May? I won't pray for my choice of party to be elected. But I will pray for the winners to prioritise care for the poor. That was the hope in South Africa, and remains so. And the same here and now.

Going Forward in Vacancy

On Monday 13 April 25 members of Orchardhill's Congregational Board met with three members of Glasgow Presbytery's Superintendence Committee. The Committee are undertaking a review of the legal procedures applying to the recent case and were keen to talk with members of the Board about the legal process the congregation have been through and any difficulties which the process itself has created. A report will be given to Presbytery in due course.

Board members spoke with great clarity about how the procedures seemed to take too long a time to complete, and during the long, drawn-out process there had been added problems because some people knew the facts but could not speak of them because of legal confidentiality whereas most people did not know the facts and heard only rumours. Most difficult of all was that office-bearers and congregation received no official information. The Committee listened carefully to these observations and said that they expect the procedures will be simplified and improved because of the kind of problems the process caused here in Orchardhill. They hope that no other congregation will have to face the same difficulties.

The Committee then spoke about how Orchardhill might now move forward. The Committee recommended that Orchardhill should begin the process of setting up the Nominating Committee to search for a new minister and that Orchardhill should at the same time ensure that work is done to help to ease any tensions which might still remain in the congregation. The Presbytery's Vacancy Procedure Committee will set this plan in motion, and an Advisory Committee will come to meet with the Kirk Session in the near future.

The Committee and the people from the Congregational Board welcomed an offer from the *Locum* Minister, who said that if it was acceptable to the Presbytery and to Orchardhill he would be glad to continue as *Locum* and Interim Moderator at Orchardhill beyond the currently agreed six-month period in the hope of helping the congregation during this period of vacancy.

Kirk's New Survey

The Church of Scotland is launching a major survey to understand the size and impact of its congregations in parishes the length and breadth of Scotland. 'What Counts?' is the question being asked by the Church's Mission Statistics co-ordinator, Rev Dr Fiona Tweedie.

Dr Tweedie, who is an expert statistician, is designing what will be large scale information gathering exercise for the Church. She explains: "For years we have asked congregations to tell us the number of members and elders, yet the impact of our congregations in their communities goes far beyond that. 'What Counts?' is an exciting opportunity for us to find out what people are doing right across Scotland!"

As a first step towards discovering the effect our congregations are having, Dr Tweedie wishes to hear views from across the Church at all levels:

- What congregational information would help you do your work?
- Why?
- How would you collect that data?
- What do you want to tell the wider Kirk?

The answers she receives will help to shape the survey which will be piloted this December. The pilot will be followed up with formal suggestions for change being offered to the General Assembly in 2016 before the full survey is conducted.

'What Counts?' is being described as an important initiative for the future of the Church by the Moderator of the General Assembly, Rt Rev John Chalmers. "During my Moderatorial year I have witnessed first-hand the energy and dynamism of many congregations who draw on significant numbers of volunteers to make a real difference in their communities," he observed.

"I have also noticed the number of people withdrawing from their physical communities into the world of social media, and we must reach out to them too. Collecting more accurate data on the wide scope of our Church will present us with challenges as well as opportunities, and we must be ready for them. This is an initiative we must all do our best to make succeed."
