An Old-fashioned Christmas

Dear members and friends of Orchardhill,

Food is an accurate measure of our wealth, both as individuals and as a society. Giffnock's new fish and chip shop is the first such establishment of my acquaintance to offer, on its menu, half a lobster – albeit at £14.95: with the full lobster at £29.95.

And now that Christmas is approaching we are being challenged to find the delicacy or the culinary extravagance that will lift the meal on that Day of Celebration to an even higher level of significance than the feasts we are able to enjoy any day of any week. As soon as the Hallowe'en market finishes on 31 October the supermarkets begin to advertise their special Christmas fare. Parents and grandparents at once begin putting in their orders for turkeys and haunches of venison and glazed Christmas puddings to ensure a truly traditional Christmas.

The echo of the Christian Christmas can still be heard in the background music of Christmas carols in public places, for instance, and in this year's Post Office issue of Christmas stamps with their six images from the Nativity story. But for the most part the historic Christian teaching and practice about Advent and Christmas have vanished.

For many centuries church-going Christians regarded the four weeks of Advent as a time of preparation for Christmas, marked by a measure of fasting, just like the 40 days of Lent before Easter. To those who had eaten sparsely during the weeks of Advent the feast on Christmas Day was the meal of the year.

Mary and I were in Africa during a rural famine in 2008. The hospital we lived in could feed protein to patients and staff only once a week – a plate of beans. But they made a huge effort to provide a Christmas dinner. A cow was slaughtered so there was beef stew; there were chicken and potatoes and rice and sadza and cabbage. How everyone looked forward to that feast, and how everyone enjoyed it with laughter and singing! The fast had been followed by a feast.

Perhaps it really was an old-fashioned Christmas!

Overnight in Science Centre

On Friday 13 November four Junior Section Boys and two leaders from Orchardhill's Boys' Brigade company set off for the Glasgow Science Centre, where, along with about 400 boys and officers from all over Scotland, they enjoyed a sleepover.

After checking in and being allocated our luggage bin we all set off to explore and try out the various activities on floor 1 of the Science Centre. Among the boys we think all activities were attempted: from making a rocket and launching it to see how far it would travel to playing in the Space Zone and completing the puzzles.

At about 6.30pm half the number filed into the Science Show Theatre, where various experiments were carried out relating to our body, our diet, and what happened to our food through our digestive system. The finale was an experiment using a Bunsen burner, funnel, and tube, and we think icing sugar, which was lit and created great balls of fire. We were sitting at the front, and the heat was tremendous.

Again we had some free time and explored floor 2: My World of Work and Life, Powering the Future, and the Lab. We also picked our spot for sleeping.

8.00pm came all too soon, and we set off to the Planetarium. This was all about the stars, a trip to the moon, a trip to the outer galaxy, and then the various planets. It was all interesting and very informative.

Free time again, and we explored Body Works on the third floor.

10.00pm was supper time: very welcome hot chocolate, devotions, and then up to our allocated "bedroom" for the night. Lights out at midnight.

Subdued lighting came on about 5.30am, and at 6.00 it was everybody up. Each floor was gradually cleared of bedding, and a welcome light breakfast was served from 7.00 onwards before we set off home about 8.00 as the Centre had to be empty by 9.00.

A very worthwhile Friday evening, and we are sure the boys learned a great deal as well as realising the Boys' Brigade is much wider than just our company and our district but all over Scotland. Our boys were well behaved and were a credit to themselves, their parents, and to the 86th. Thank you to all who organised the event and to the staff of the Science Centre. Because of the heavy demand it may be three years before we can go again!
