Friendships across the Faiths

Dear Members and friends of Orchardhill,

For several years I have been aware that I have no Moslem friends. It is difficult to find occasions for meeting and discussion. I usually meet Moslems when they are at their work, in a shop or on a bus or in a taxi.

Recent months have seen the conflict in the Middle East intensify. Huge numbers of refugees have been fleeing into Europe. The Paris attacks in December have raised fears of IS-inspired assaults in public places. In this atmosphere I have sensed the need for making friendships with people of other faiths in order to counteract suspicion and fear. Yet how are such friendships to be started and how are they to grow?

Last month I learned of a programme of meetings being organised by Interfaith Glasgow. The Festivals Exchange project provided opportunities for people from different faith and belief backgrounds to gain a better understanding – and first-hand experience – of each other's religious festivals. The first festival was celebrated at the home of Glasgow's Sikh community at the Gurdwara and the second at Gorbals Parish Church on Christmas Eve. Mary and I put our names down to go to the third.

On 7 January we were among the 25 or so guests at the local mosque in Pollokshields. It was the festival to celebrate the birth of the prophet Mohammad. We were invited to be present at the evening prayers, to learn something of the history of their community, and to share the meal that was provided for us all.

Warmly welcomed, we were invited to remove our shoes, and we received a suitable covering for our heads. Then, seated on the floor, we watched everyone pray: bowing their heads to the ground and reciting and singing the words of worship and prayer. With the prayers completed, the Imam explained some of the community's history. Then a doctor who works in the Queen Elizabeth Hospital related some stories of the Prophet.

While everyone ate vegetarian pizza, quiet discussions continued into the evening. For me the strongest memory is the warmth of the welcome. Friendships are surely beginning.

Lodging House Mission

The Lodging House Mission continues to work closely with Glasgow City Mission and the other services caring for rough sleepers over the winter period – till the end of March. Rough sleepers and people with nowhere to sleep are welcome to use the Glasgow Winter Night Shelter for emergency accommodation. The service operates from the LHM in East Campbell Street.

In the mornings the LHM will connect people to Glasgow City Council's homelessness care team in order that homeless accommodation can be found. But also, in the morning, users of the service can remain in the LHM and take advantage of free food, accommodation, warmth, and a host of support facilities such as health improvement, legal advice, form-filling, and many other services and activities.

Kirk's Same-sex Marriage Vote

The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland is to debate whether congregations should be allowed to consider calling a person in a same-sex marriage as a minister or deacon. The discussion will take place in May this year after a majority of Presbyteries voted in favour by approving an Overture amending the Ministers and Deacons in Civil Partnerships Act (Act I 2015).

A total of 25 Presbyteries, including Glasgow, voted in favour and 19 against with one Presbytery tied. A total of 1207 presbyters were in favour and 1096 against. Glasgow's vote in December was 115-72. Regardless of the Presbyteries' vote, the General Assembly will have the final say on this matter.

At the General Assembly in May last year the Church of Scotland approved legislation which gave leave to individual congregations to call a minister or appoint a deacon who was in a civil partnership. This legislation, however, did not include recognition of ministers or deacons who might be in a same-sex marriage. An amendment was proposed which would extend permission to allow congregations to consider inducting or appointing a minister or deacon who was in a same-sex marriage.

However, the General Assembly was careful to note that the matter under discussion was simply to permit ministers in same sex marriages to be inducted or appointed on the same basis as those in civil partnerships. This acknowledgment of legal standing is quite separate from and does not prejudge the Church's theological understanding of marriage as a covenant between a man and a woman. Nor is the question of the theology of marriage under discussion in relation to consideration of this Overture.

The proposed legislation was sent to Presbyteries as an Overture for consideration under a process known as the Barrier Act. Returns from Presbyteries were due to be received by the Principal Clerk, the Very Rev John Chalmers, by 31 December.

A Church of Scotland spokesman said: "Now Presbyteries have returned their votes, we will begin making arrangements to report the outcome of the vote to Commissioners at the General Assembly next May. They will hold a debate and vote on whether to make this proposed legislation into standing Church Law through the passing of the Act."
