Harvest: Home?

Forced by political insecurity, fearing violence and suffering a lack of basic necessities, a family with its roots deep in a Middle Eastern nation is forced to flee for the second time in, perhaps, not much more than a decade. The second attempt at refuge is more precarious than the first: it relies entirely on a wafer-thin possibility that tenuous family connections are remembered across many years despite no contact being made. It is with nothing more than such a hope that Naomi sets out west from Moab with her daughters-in-law and faces either a perilous voyage across the Dead Sea or a lengthy walk through inhospitable desert. In starting this journey she sets the scene for the well-beloved harvest story of Ruth.

The story continues as the migrants are noticed, their potential economic activity recognised and also as theological reflection goes hand in hand with commercial practice and political awareness. It is a story for our times; read through the universalising influence of Christian faith, it allows no room for complacency. Charity can never be confined to one's own family tree. Boaz recognises and desires to reward Ruth's remarkable faithfulness to Naomi, but he sees, too, that she has sought refuge not simply from him as a distant relative but has come to the God of Israel "under whose wings" he recognises she seeks refuge.

We celebrate harvest in this season, though in truth we reap the benefits of a hundred harvests across the globe throughout each year. We may also consider our Christian response to care for a fragile creation even as we express gratitude for what we enjoy. As we find ourselves - at this point in our history and geography - well-resourced while many are embarking on their second or third journey seeking refuge, we might be informed by Boaz's perspective.

In whose name do we offer – or decline to offer – basic security and sufficient sustenance against starvation? Is it our own name or that of our nation or in some way representing the God to whom others are looking, hoping to find help in their desperate need and life in the midst of death?


November's Orchardhill Record Deadline

Visiting by the Minister

I thought it might be helpful for me to outline through the pages of the Orchardhill Record a possible starting-place for the way I'd like to offer you pastoral support as your Minister. Of course, through conversations among us, this may change and develop; it seems helpful, though, to give you some notion about how I plan to go about things initially.

My view is that visiting as the Minister to offer you the assurance of the prayerful concern of the church and to allow you an opportunity, entirely in confidence, to speak about matters which are of importance to you is a vital part of parish ministry. I am keen to visit as many of you as would benefit from such a visit; at that same time, I don't want unduly to pester or impose a burden on you. I therefore need both your guidance and, to some extent, your support in taking the initiative.

John Miller has helpfully provided me with a list of those whom he visited, and this shall form the basis of my visits for the first couple of months or so. However, situations change, and you should always feel free to contact me in any of the ways described below if you'd like a chat, or to let me know how things are doing, or to arrange that we meet up.

May I dispel two inaccurate views? First, ministers (and certainly this one) aren't telepathic: it is much easier for them to respond to people who get in touch with them than it is to know who ought to be contacted. Second, you are never being a nuisance if you get in touch with the minister. If I make an arrangement for us to meet a few days after you call, text, email or chat to me in person, I'm really organising my time so that you are not intruding or imposing at all. Do, please, contact me particularly if there's a matter on which you feel my support might be helpful. If you are in hospital, why not text or call me using your mobile phone? You could also ask a relative to do so. My aim is to visit all who are in hospital about once each week as long as I know they are inpatients - and where they are!

You may feel a chat on the phone is sufficient. You might want to have me round to your home for a blether - and you could even take me out for a coffee! I'd encourage you to use my mobile phone, ideally by texting (you may call, but I might be with someone, in a meeting or leading a service and am less likely to take your call there and then). You can also send me an email, and I'll usually reply to email and text messages within the day.

I hope to meet with all elders responsible for pastoral care in districts fairly soon, and I'm very conscious that the long-standing connection built up between district elder and member is the key pastoral relationship within the church. However, I'd far rather two people knew about an important issue than no one did, so do feel free to get in touch with me directly if you think that would be helpful.

If you think this broad approach could be improved, or refined, then do please also let me know. I value your insight and hope that, by sharing different approaches, we might all learn and grow together.

Thinking Allowed

Thinking Allowed's 2016-217 programme has been finalised, with four events in Orchardhill and four at Cairns Church, Milngavie.

Orchardhill's programme starts on Thursday 3 November, when Rev David McLachlan, Minister of Langside Church, will deliver his lecture titled "The Gift of Doubt". David is a regular Thought for the Day guest on BBC Radio Scotland.

On Wednesday 23 November Rev Peter Macdonald, leader of the Iona Community, will speak about "The Iona Community Transforming Lives to Change the World - The work of the Iona Community and the challenges of the future".

Following the well-received TED Talks of last year's programme, this year's event will have Jody Williams and Scilla Elworthy giving their lectures, respectively "A Realistic Vision for World Peace" and "Fighting with Nonviolence". These will take place on Thursday 2 February.

Finally, on Thursday 9 March, Very Rev John Miller, former Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, returns to Orchardhill to deliver his lecture on "What Shall We Tell the Grandchildren?"

Cairns' programme starts on Thursday 27 October, when Professor Kenneth McColl, Professor of Gastroenterology at the University of Glasgow will speak on "How Medical Science Makes Progress— and what about the Church?"

Rev Scott McKenna, Minister of Mayfield Salisbury Parish Church, Edinburgh, will speak on "The Most Important Journey in Life is the Inner Journey" on Thursday 17 November.

On Thursday 12 January Myra MacDonald, author and former Reuters Bureau Chief for India, will deliver a topical lecture on "Pakistan: Politics and Religion".

Finally, on Thursday 23 February, Rev Julie Nicholson will deliver the Roy Paterson Memorial Lecture. Julie, resident in Bristol, was a Vicar in the Church of England. On 7 July 2005 her daughter was one of the 52 people who lost their lives in the terrorist bombings in London. Her lecture is titled "Crossing Places" and addresses the choices people make about how to live and thrive in the shadow of death and trauma. Her deeply moving book, A Song for Jenny, was adapted for television by the BBC last year.


