What goes on at the Cross?

Recent fabric work carried out in Orchardhill has included the installation of a cross in the newly-refurbished Session Room. A generous and anonymous gift, it is a work of craftsmanship in walnut whose colour complements the roof timbers. Neither ostentatious nor imposing, such a symbol in a room like this is not without significance.

For it is a place where much work which would readily be identified as 'churchy' is carried out. It is not only for the use of the Kirk Session, though (as the name suggests) it is the place where the Session meets: those gatherings exercise and reflect on leadership and oversight in the congregation. The Congregational Board also meets there and ensures good stewardship of material resources. The Guild also meets there, and Thinking Allowed; it is the space where we celebrate Communion just before lunch for some less agile members. The children of Stepping Stones had their party there, the choir and CrossWords rehearse there from time to time, and each Tuesday and Thursday there is the hubbub of conversation as scones and delicious soup – and more – are consumed at the Orchardhill Café, and children from Imagifun play on the floor as their parents and carers chat together.

The cross is a symbol (in some ways a strange one) of God's self-giving in Christ. Not just giving over to death, but giving in the life of Jesus which preceded the events at Calvary and, as an empty cross in the light of resurrection, the life of God made present in the world today through the Spirit of the risen Christ. People think seriously, rehearse for worship, reflect on their experience of life and faith, remember in elements of bread and wine, pray, have fun, show concern through conversation and enjoy being together across the generations. They do this beneath a cross.

All these things have always taken place in God's presence. Now, perhaps, this is made slightly more apparent through the display of an ancient and global image. All the variety of activities, as all life, is graced by the presence of the God of life. Perhaps the cross on the wall will encourage such a thought in you and in others in years to come.

Visa Problem Resolved

The Hyderabad problem has been resolved. The group from the Diocese of Hyderabad will be at full strength when they visit Scotland as guests of Glasgow Presbytery this month.

Initially, as reported in the Orchardhill Record's January edition, two of the four in the Hyderabad group had been refused visas by the UK Visas and Immigration Department even though the Home Office had been advised in advance that the visit was being fully funded by the Church of Scotland's World Mission Council Faithshare Fund. However, it was reported to the Presbytery meeting on 13 December that one of the two refusals had been overturned. Then over the New Year weekend the Church of Scotland website reported that the last visa had been granted.

The Eastwood MP, Kirsten Oswald, has been vigorously diligent in seeking to overturn the original visa refusals. She picked up this case as soon as she was advised in early November, and she went as far as to raising the matter in the Westminster Parliament at Prime Minister's Question in early December.

February's visit by the Hyderabad Diocese group is a step towards an official twinning arrangement with Glasgow Presbytery.

TED Talks

Following up the well-received TED Talks of last year's Thinking Allowed programme, this session's event will feature Jody Williams and Scilla Elworthy giving lectures, respectively "A Realistic Vision for World Peace" and "Fighting with Nonviolence". These will take place in Orchardhill on Thursday 2 February.

In more than 100 years of Nobel Peace Prizes, only a dozen women have ever won. Civil-rights and peace activist Jody Williams received the award in 1997 as the chief strategist of the International Campaign to Ban Landmines, which established the first global treaty banning antipersonnel mines.

Williams believes that peace is defined by human (not national) security and that it must be achieved through sustainable development, environmental justice, and meeting people's basic needs. To this end, she co-founded the Nobel Women's Initiative, endorsed by six female Peace laureates. She chairs the effort to support activists, researchers, and others working toward peace, justice, and equality for women and thus humanity. Williams also continues to fight for the total global eradication of landmines.

How do you deal with a bully without becoming a thug? In this wise and soulful talk, peace activist Scilla Elworthy maps out the skills we need — as nations and individuals — to fight extreme force without using force in return. To answer the question of why and how nonviolence works, she evokes historical heroes —Aung San Suu Kyi, Mahatma Gandhi, Nelson Mandela — and the personal philosophies that powered their peaceful protests.

Finally, on Thursday 9 March, Very Rev John Miller, former Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, returns to Orchardhill to deliver his lecture on "What Shall We Tell the Grandchildren?"

Cairns Church, Milngavie, hosts the Roy Paterson Memorial Lecture in the Thinking Allowed on Thursday 23 February. The speaker will be Rev Julie Nicholson.
