A Word from your Minister



Children and young people matter

During November we very much hope that our new children, families and youth worker shall begin with us. More details will be given just as soon as necessary pre-employment checks are completed. This might be a good time to remember why we're doing this. Put simply, it's because children and young people matter to God.

We're not primarily engaging someone to increase the number of young people attending Sunday worship. While we would love to see more, and are delighted to welcome any families and teenagers who join with us, we recognise the world has changed and Sunday mornings, for many people – but by no means all – are not associated with worship.

We're not entrusting all our work with younger members of our fellowship to someone else, so that we can breathe with some relief and pass the buck. Just as it takes a whole village to raise a child it takes a whole congregation to encourage a young person in faith. Our specialist support for this area of ministry is intended to help us engage better with our young people, and others.

We give priority to this work because we recognise that the church, and Jesus himself, does so. He put a child in the midst of the disciples as an example of child-like – though not childish – faith, and rebuked those who tried to prevent families bringing their young ones to be blessed by him.

Perhaps we will see greater activity among younger people at different times of the week: we would positively welcome that. We may not see transformational development in the next few months, but we will be excited to see whether, in a decade's time, our work now will have an impact on other congregations - and ours.

In all this, we recognise the privilege of mission: that we are invited to discern what God is doing, and join in. There is no doubt that young lives matter to God; as we express in a tangible way our commitment to those in our congregation and community, we look to see what God is doing among them, that we may join in. Who knows what we might all discover. How might we grow together in faith and creative service?





ANNA BLAIR - An Appreciation

Anna Blair



12TH FEBRUARY 1927 - 14TH SEPTEMBER

With the recent passing of Anna Blair, Orchardhill has lost a most gracious lady, and its pre-eminent historian.

She first attended this Church as a 4 year-old in 1931, having moved from Mosspark to Giffnock with her parents and elder brother. After joining the Sunday School, and later becoming a Communicant member, she trained as a P.E. teacher during the latter part of World War 2, then met and married Matt, who was 12 years her senior. They taught together in the Sunday School for some 30 years, albeit time off was required for the births of David in 1955, and Dorothy in 1957.

Always keen on writing, Anna took the opportunity of a 4-month period of immobilization after spinal fusion in 1972, to gather her thoughts and papers, which had accumulated on the subject of Matt's family tree, from Covenanting times in rural Ayrshire, up until the time of his birth in 1915. A trilogy of novels resulted from this work, and she went on to write several books of Scottish short stories, including 'Tea at Miss Cranston's', 'More Tea at Miss Cranston's', 'Croft and Creel' and 'The Goose Girl of Eriska'. She was much in demand to speak at Book Festivals, and at meetings of the Guild in this, and a number of other Churches.

'The Kirk on the Hill', her history book of Orchardhill and the Giffnock community, was first published in 1990, 10 years before the centenary, then written up with an extra chapter in 2000, to mark 100 years since the building was opened for worship. It was a labour of love for Anna, but a time-consuming labour nevertheless, which has been deeply appreciated by her fellow members, and not least by our ministers, then and since.

After this work, she was the obvious choice to write the text for our centenary pageant in 1999-2000, not only helping as author, but also as producer and director, in collaboration with Marion Simpson, and the late Jinty Graham. It was titled 'Passing on the Cross', and required her firm but kind instructions to improve the diction and stagecraft of those performing.

She followed Matt in being ordained an Elder in 1994, and made cogent and constructive contributions to Kirk Session meetings, as well as taking to the pulpit from time to time, to lead services. Hers was a well-informed, and very firm faith, such that her long life was fully committed to the Christian Church, and, in particular, to the Church of Scotland at Orchardhill. May she rest in the peace of her Lord, Jesus Christ.

Last year we distributed presents to over 600 children and this year we're delighted that **Giffnock**

Primary School have decided to take part by having their own tree in the school hall.

The organisations being supported this year are:

Glasgow Care Foundation.

For 140 years this organisation has been supporting and caring for people in Glasgow. They strive to help people turn their lives around and give them a chance. They do this by meeting the urgent needs of those referred to them by Social Services and other agencies. Their support is very practical and includes helping families with gifts at Christmas.

Quarriers Family Resource Centre, Ruchazie

The Centre works with families experiencing difficulties. These difficulties can arise as a result of a range of issues such as poverty, domestic abuse or mental health issues. To achieve a more balanced family life, the Centre offers programmes to aid bonding, attachment and the building of positive relationships.

Family Addiction Support Services

FASS was started by parents in Glasgow in 1986 who were concerned by the growing drug problem in the city. Since then FASS has helped countless families and individuals to cope with the effects of addiction. FASS offers free one to one support to family members affected by alcohol or drug problems.

Glasgow's Young Persons Befriending Service

This service provides support to isolated and vulnerable 8-18 year olds living in the Glasgow area. The service matches young people who are experiencing difficulties with adult volunteers. The young people get the opportunity to have fun but also to build a relationship with a supportive adult, experience personal development and have access to activities and community resources otherwise outwith their reach.

Aberlour Trust

This charity has a very long and impressive history and today works with children, young people and families across Scotland helping to transform their lives for the better. They help children and young people overcome significant challenges such as growing up and leaving care, living with a disability and dealing with the impact of drugs and alcohol on family life. Giving children the best start possible is at the heart of what they do.

Women and Children First in Paisley

This organisation provides a range of support services to women and children who have experienced rape, sexual assault, physical abuse, harassment and/ or child sexual abuse, whether at home or in the wider community.

Falkirk Social Services


The contact with FSS is through a lady called Lorraine Hanlon, who always goes beyond the requirements of her job description to meet the needs of the families she seeks to help. She works with families who really are suffering, including travelling people and asylum seekers.

What's happening at The Orchard Community Café?

The Nursery boys and girls have been enjoying Bookbug sessions listening to stories and joining in songs and rhymes. These have been much enjoyed by some of our older ladies and gentlemen who seem to know the words very well! Primary six youngsters also came for juice and biscuits and a chance to chat with many customers about their school and lives.



The charity this month is Tearfund who are asking for money to provide toilets and good sanitation together



with education about cholera and other diseases. Almost 1 in 3 people in the world do not have a safe place to go to the toilet. Let us help them as much as we can!

We now have a 'Happy to chat' table where anyone may go and sit and share stories or just listen. Come and join us there!

Scottish Huntington's Association's Big Sing



We are delighted to announce the return of Scottish Huntington's Association's Big Sing on Sunday, 1 December 2019 at 6.30pm – 9.00pm, following its great success last year. It promises to be just as wonderful this time around, with performances from the Falkirk Junior Gaelic Choir, Giffnock Primary School Choir and the amazing Rock Choir.

Tickets cost just £10 (u-16s are free) and all proceeds will help to change the lives of families in Scotland who are living with Huntington's disease, a serious neurological condition that damages the brain. The disease affects thinking processes, personality and mood, and can lead to serious mental health problems. Physically, the symptoms include jerky, uncontrollable movements, mobility difficulties and the loss of ability to eat, drink, and speak. Many people with Huntington's disease need 24-hour care, meaning they are no longer able to stay in their own homes.

The toll on families is compounded by the reality that each child of an HD positive parent is at 50% risk of inheriting the gene that leads to the disease.

Set up by families in 1989, Scottish Huntington's Association is a world leader in the support of HD families while working towards equal care for everyone in Scotland whose life is affected by Huntington's disease.

That commitment led to the world's first National Care Framework for Huntington's disease, supported by the Scottish Government. With local frameworks in place across Scotland, families and health and social care providers now have a blueprint to deliver improved, joined-up, multi-agency support.

Every day, the charity delivers three core services across Scotland. Our HD Specialists work directly with families and carers to co-ordinate care and support, and provide information and guidance. A specialist youth team reaches children who are living with the genetic risk and are often caring for an ill parent, and the Financial Wellbeing Service supports those facing hardship as a result of the disease.

These three services are enhanced by a network of family support groups to reduce the isolation felt as a result of the stigma that, even today, surrounds Huntington's disease.

By supporting the Big Sing, you will help SHA to move closer still to reaching every individual and family in Scotland, especially those in areas of the country who don't have access to the charity's lifeline services.

Come along, sing up, and together we will raise the roof for HD families all over Scotland!

SoundWaves-Making a Joyful Sound



SoundWaves is a music group for children in primary 3 to secondary 1, where they can enjoy singing and learning to play music. We meet on a Tuesday evening from 6.15-8pm in the Church Hall, where we spend the first half learning to play instruments and the second half singing songs. Our instrument groups include recorders of various sizes and both tuned and non-tuned percussion instruments, giving the children the chance to play anything from a xylophone to a tambourine, tubular bells to glockenspiels.

SoundWaves children's music group began in November 1990

with 33 boys and girls and its first stage show, "Holy Moses" was in May 1991. The emphasis has been to encourage children to develop their musical talents and enjoy being part of various sized musical groups. There are also opportunities for solos in our public performances. We want the children to have fun and develop a lifelong interest in music. Some of our present leaders were members, and four of our former members are now professional musicians!

Some of the youngsters are involved with the Church in other ways. SoundWaves has contributed to many Sunday services and every December in the Church we present the Christmas story and message. More recently, we have also been part of the Orchardhill Christmas Fayre and once again this year will be performing some Christmas favourites at 1pm on Saturday 23rd November. This year, "Celebrate Christmas with SoundWaves" is on Sunday 15th December at 6.30pm in the Church. We need your continued support, so why not come along to both these events and join in our Christmas celebrations.

SoundWaves has also donated a huge amount to various charities, linked to Church of Scotland projects and other good causes, from monies raised from show profits and specific fundraisers. A sum in excess of £19,000 has been donated over the years.

Our big event of the year is our stage production at the end of March. Watch this space for details of our next exciting performance and make sure you don't miss out on your tickets! Box office opens February!

Orchardhill Junior Badminton Club

In 1968 the Junior Club was started by Mary Russell and Will Taylor. They asked a young Anne Birrell, a member of the senior club, if she could help out on a Saturday morning from 10 till 12noon. The children were, and still are, aged between 10 and 16, and consist of beginners up to some more accomplished players.

Anne gained her coaching award in 1973 and was "hooked by the flight of the shuttlecock". From September to April each year since 1968, she has helped 20 to 26 youngsters from the community

clear, smash and drop the shuttle over the net while having fun and making friends.





Anne's dedicated service to badminton was recently recognised on her retirement by East Renfrewshire Culture and Leisure when she was presented by the Provost of Eastwood, Jim Fletcher, with a Lifetime Achievement Award for Volunteering.

By coincidence the club was holding its own surprise "Thank You" celebration the following morning. Euan Murray, our Badminton Scotland representative, our Elder, Colin Williamson, the Minister and many present and former members gathered to celebrate

Anne's years at the club. There was coffee and cake to be enjoyed and memories shared. As Anne said in her speech, seeing children and young people enjoying their badminton and learning to cope with winning and losing meant such a lot to her. Lessons are learned during every session (typical schoolteacher!) relating to their future lives, as children who play badminton - or any sport - should have fun, make friends, exercise, practise skills, learn to

work as a team, and importantly learn to play fair and by the rules.

Anne's hope was that every child grow up in some kind of sport promoting these aims: she has helped more children than can be counted, to achieve that goal.
